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**Credit and Debit Limits on CES Accounts introduced**

At our recent AGM we adopted the proposal to have all members set limits on their CES accounts. For several years we have been concerned about a few members who trade well outside their means. The idea was first proposed at our 2014 AGM but opinions were evenly divided so this year the proposal was modified and readily accepted. Rather than a "one size fits all" approach or an admin heavy, customized version we adopted a "self managing" model.

Members set their own limits based on what they feel is manageable. The credit and debit limits are the same. Basically each member decides on the limit they feel comfortable with, lets Admin know and Admin enters those values. The members then trades within those limits. If the member wants to change their limit they just need to notify Admin.

It will be a gradual process to get all members to set their limits but you can speed this process by contacting Admin directly and notifying us of your chosen limits. You can simply email your details and your selected limit to: [wais@community-exchange.org](mailto:wais@community-exchange.org) or contact our office.

Debit and credit limits are not new to our exchange - as they were in place before we joined CES in 2006 - but because CES did not have the functionality at the time we had to remove the limits. CES has since added this feature and unlike our previous database limits are enforceable and trades taking a members account past their limit will be processed.

Members are advised to consider their limits and their trading carefully so they are able to work comfortably between the limits. The system will display warnings and if a

transaction won't go through members are advised to take action so the trade can be honoured in some other way or at a later date. Maintaining good communication and trading relationships is very important.

This new addition to our members agreement replaces the old #3 which was combined into #2. Other changes are in article #11 which was reworded to state when a member "leaves the exchange" ... "Annual subscriptions are still due until the members a/c is zeroed and closed". Finally #12 has had the option of paying subscriptions in W\$ removed. Copies of the new "Membership Agreement 2015" are on our websites.

## FAQ's for the IRD

From time to time members ask us about taxation issues as they relate to IRD. Here's one that came up recently followed by the IRD response and a point of contact for other queries.

### Question

Let's say I started a business using Green Dollars – purchased materials and equipment to produce something and in doing so decided to become GST registered. When I filled in my first return I found I had G\$400.00 in GST refund. Would this be honoured by IRD in NZ dollars? In the same context as the business proposition of that question, would IRD require a \$NZ tax payment on any G\$ tax payment on any G\$ earnings even if the IRD wouldn't make a GST refund?

### Answer

The answer is yes. If a customer is registered for GST and their return has resulted in a refund, the amount due would be refunded in NZ dollars. Where the customer's GST return results in an amount to pay, the expectation is that the customer will make payment of the due amount in NZ\$. AJ Hunter's stunning market posters and newsletters, plus our frequent email lists of offerings, wants and announcements, all help. We keep trying new ways to promote our Exchange and our activities but we always like to put priority on supporting our existing members rather than recruiting new.

I wish to thank our loyal Committee, Guardians, and staff for their commitment to the organisation, especially this year. Our staff, Catie-Lou and Keith, continued to do a sterling job with our day-to-day operations. We are looking forward to hearing more from Catie-Lou's attendance at the CES Conference in Australia. However we are not so much looking forward to Keith's retirement next month. For ten years Keith has coordinated our Exchange in a multitude of ways including our markets, promotion and, most importantly, our grants. On your behalf I wish to formally and sincerely thank Keith for his exceptional contribution and wish him all the very best.

Now we need to work on new ways to divvy up our tasks and responsibilities. At tonight's AGM I'd like to see hands go up to take on the roles we need filled in order to thrive. ## The Key Man behind your CES account... Tim Jenkin

Some check it daily, others every couple of days yet others weekly or when the email updates come through, our online CES accounts are something we may easily take for granted as we log in to check the latest listings in the directory or to add or remove offers and wants as the need may be or put in some recommendations. Before CES, record-keeping for trades and offerings and wants was a long paper generating process that took up a lot of admin time and even longer to receive it in the post. There was no 24/7 online directory for instant access to what's available, no text phones for quick messages, no emails for enquiries and no instant messaging facebook. Even when businesses first started using them, personal computers were so uncommon that the majority of regular people wouldn't have known how to turn one on much less how to use it. So the process of entering sales for traders were always up to admins in the various LETS orgs to do. Obtaining a statement balance was a once monthly occurrence and could be often out of date by the time you received it at the end of the month with your newsletter. Alternative trading systems have come a long way since those days, in no small way through the vision, dedication, efforts and achievements of Tim Jenkin, the is programmer & designer of the CES software that we use to process our WAIS trades.

Before developing the CES programme that opened the way for like-minded people worldwide to improve their lifestyle by trading goods & services without using their federal dollars, Tim had constantly put his own life in the path of danger discreetly standing up against the former apartheid government of South Africa. There's a saying that

goes "If you think you're too small to make a difference, then try sleeping in a room with a mosquito." Tim is that mosquito! While he might look like your average bookworm, behind his calm, studious exterior and beneath his quietly spoken manner is a very courageous and clever man who survived real life mission impossible situations and helped countless people in his quest against both poverty and racism in his own country and beyond it. National Geographic filmed the documentary "Escape from Pretoria" (find it on our WAIS Trading Facebook page) covering this very famous escape from the High Security prison back in the late 70s. This peace-loving man was sentenced to 12 years jail as a terrorist and his comrade 8 years, for trying to peacefully empower the non-white races in their country through education, wanting to bring an end to the hostile and intolerable attitude & environment coloured races had to endure in daily life there. Tim and two comrades left the prison 10 and a half years before his sentence was up and they did so in the same quiet and orderly manner that Tim does everything. To tell you how would be spoiling the plot for those who haven't seen the documentary but it's well worth your viewing time and it will keep you on the edge of your seat. After escaping and living in exile in London for 12 years, Tim returned to his home country appalled at the poverty and lack of resources available to the poor. Realizing that everybody to some degree is 'talent rich' he adopted Michael Lintons L.E.T.S. to his country and eventually created the online Ces program to make recording trading transactions a simple and paperless process. The success of the system grew and then spread to other countries as more and more people valued exchange trading systems and their relationships as the perfect solution to fill the leaks in the federal money system. Now some 800 groups in 40 countries are using Ces to record trades. Whether it's the majority of local based trading being done or the less regular 'remote' trades between other groups or countries, Tim is the global super-admin man behind it all.

The most serious part of the evening was next and revolved around changes to our membership agreement. After much mature discussion the proposals were all adopted with some amendments. From the most serious activity to the most fun was our traditional mystery auction. Hayden & Roger shared the auctioneering duties. Some of deceptively wrapped packages generated far more bids than they deserved but most bidders were happy with the return on their "investments". The auction raised a record of nearly \$W500 for our Admin coffers.

phone, tax or power with it, so how does it help me?" It's true you can't pay your phone or tax with it....yet anyway. We do have some Green \$ landlords who accept a percentage of their rent in G\$, and in Britain a power company has recently joined the 'Bristol Pound' local currency and accepts it for payment. Maybe a NZ power company might be smart enough to see the benefits too and jump on board in the future. In the meantime, local currency traders in any country can show you how to stretch your household budget immensely when using G\$ as much as possible for your week to week spending, before you part with your cold, hard cash elsewhere. While the majority of day to day trading is done in your own region, 'remote' trading with other groups or countries is a very valuable resource, especially when travelling for any reason or holidaying. Your local and international fellow traders often go above and beyond the 'fair and reasonable' trading ethics of our system, and the local knowledge, goodwill and generosity shown to visiting traders is commonplace and a real pleasure to see and experience.

I was so well looked after while recently visiting in Queensland and the Far North, stretching from Cairns to Malanda to The Daintree Rainforest and beyond. On Wednesday

two days before the 2015 Australian LETS conference I was picked up at the Cairns airport by my lovely host Mary Etting, a recent new member to LETS and taken to her central residence in the beautiful seaside town of Palm Cove, just 10 minutes from the airport. Marys' immaculate modern house with a pagoda out front and swimming pool at the back, was complemented with gardens of native plants, flowers, bananas, limes, papaya and hydroponic vegetables. Her home was situated within a short walk to the Cairns Night Zoo one way, or turn right and a 5 minute walk down to the beachfront lined shopping centre, cafes, restaurants, beach and pier. Marys' hospitality was 5 stars serving up her fresh tropical fruit and baked muffins with a mixed grill for breakfasts, prawns and fresh tasty dishes for lunches and tea. Despite her own busy schedule as a volunteer for the Cairns Botanical Gardens, she showed me around local places of interest including Clifton Village and beach, Kerrawa rainforest beach and restaurant, included me in a beach lunch with friends and we caught "Squaring The Wheel" a theatre circus comedy act performed by Jens Altheimer at the Centre of Contemporary Arts (COCA) in Cairns. Mary dropped me off on Friday to meet Steve, Jennis Krucks partner, and he gathered the rest of

his LETS passengers for the journey. On the drive Steve shared a lot of local knowledge & history on the places we were passing through and took us to the Lake Barrine Teahouse Restaurant at the Crater Lakes National Park to enjoy the view, nature walk, and a lovely afternoon tea on the waterfront restaurant. He also showed me the highly venomous Red Belly Black Snake slithering around on the grass at the lake waterfront, which was also the only snake this kiwi came close to in its natural environment the whole trip.

The conference was held at the Quinola Lakes Conference & Camping Centre in Malanda, hosted by Tablelands LETS (whose G\$ trading region encompasses some 453kms). Cosy cabins that sleep up to 6 people, were dotted around the lush green landscape, private lakes and waterfalls surrounding the Conference Centre in this peaceful environment. The conference theme of "Local Abundance" was aptly named and fully evident among the many volunteers and G\$ paid members who sprang into action from the generous proportioned kitchen to the stage, and every area in-between. The coordination achievements of Bel, Katrin, and Jenni to make the conference a truly memorable event for the national and international visitors was top notch. The mammoth effort to organize so much including the on-going answering of questions and advising visitors in the months leading up to it, including flight deals, transport and accommodation options and local places of interest for those thinking to stay beyond the conference,. Getting all the visiting delegates from various Cairns locations transported to Malanda was quite a task in itself. There was so much to be thankful for. All the wonderful kitchen staff including caterers Leeandra Norman from "Love Lee Cooking" and Melitta Lewis from "That Retro Cafe" with her trusty cappachino machine. The abundant fresh tropical fruit and vegetables included in all the tasty snacks, meals and desserts, the sound system, entertainment
